POLICY STATEMENT
BANNED ITEMS AND RESTRICTED FIREARMS

The Moore County Wildlife and Conservation Club (“MCWCC” or “Club”), by action of its Officers and Board, hereby establishes effective **July 13, 2026**, this policy statement.

This policy specifically supersedes the January 12, 2026 statement, and additionally, if found to conflict with any other policy or administrative club rule(s), this statement will govern and control.

In the furtherance of our objective to promote the safe exercise of our rights under the 2nd Amendment, members are encouraged to utilize the Club Ranges for regularly practicing with their personal, legally possessed firearms in accordance with both Federal and NC law. However, such “Range-Use” must be constrained by the general physical limitations of the property and consideration of the applicable berm dimensions. Accordingly, in recognition of these limitations, for the safety of our members, guests and our neighbors, the Club hereby establishes the following:

ITEMS PROHIBITED FROM USE

- Ammunition designed to ignite (generating an open flame) upon impact may not be brought onto the property.
- Targets designed to ignite (generating an explosion) upon impact may not be brought onto the property.
- Bump-fire stocks (stocks designed to cause rapid fire by "bumping" the trigger against one's finger and thereby not requiring one's finger to pull on the trigger) allowing the firearm's recoil to actuate the trigger, may not be brought onto the property.

RESTRICTED FIREARMS

- NFA Class 3 Full Auto firearms require specific approval to be brought onto the property.
- Firearms equipped with a Forced Reset Trigger (“FRT”) must be registered with the Club prior to being brought onto the property.

The above is not a comprehensive list of banned or restricted use items; please refer to the published administrative guidance and follow instructions from the Club’s RSOs with regards to specific additional items that may not be permitted (or subject to additional prerequisites for use) onto Club property.

The following further outlines administrative guidance for the use of **Restricted Firearms**:

1. Only a member in Good Standing, and in compliance with following registration process, may bring a Restricted Firearm onto Club property.
2. In advance of bringing a Restricted Firearm onto Club property, the member must complete a Registration Form (online form). Members having obtained permission to bring a Restricted Firearm onto Club property must renew this permission as part of their annual membership renewal. The Club reserves the right to assess an additional charge for permitting a Restricted Firearm to be brought onto Club property.
3. A range may be reserved for specific time and date, to promote the safe use of a Restricted Firearm. Any such reservation must be approved in writing by a Club CRSO.
4. For NFA Class 3 Full Auto firearms, when in fully automatic mode, the firearm must be tethered or hard mounted to a tripod.
5. The member must adhere to the direction of the CRSO (or designated RSO) involving the safe operation of the Restricted Firearm. Such direction may include having an RSO present while shooting, and a list of prerequisites (emailed to the member) for the use of the Restricted Firearm. Additionally, the member should retain an electronic copy (or image) of their Registration Form and be prepared to present it when shooting a Restricted Firearm, if requested by a Club RSO, Officer or Board Member.
6. The Club acknowledges that its RSOs are all volunteers and as such, members who utilize their services are encouraged to show appreciation directly to the RSO via an appropriate gratuity.
7. Notwithstanding the foregoing, our Club RSOs have final authority in all safety-related matters on the property. Accordingly, should an RSO observe behavior he or she deems unsafe, the RSO is empowered to prohibit the use (or continued use) of a Restricted Firearm.

FORCED RESET TRIGGER ("FRT") DISTANCE LIMITATIONS

When using a Forced Reset Trigger ("FRT") without RSO supervision, and unless the firearm is hard mounted to a tripod in such a way as to prevent any changes to elevation, you must:

- Adhere to a **25-yard maximum distance from the berm** when firing an FRT-equipped rifle **from the bench or prone position**. The rifle must be firmly gripped with both hands to prevent unintended muzzle lift.
- When prone, ALWAYS be cognizant of any muzzle elevation in relation to the target which, when combined with muzzle rise, could send rounds over the berm.
- Adhere to a **15-yard maximum distance from the berm** when firing **from a standing or kneeling position**.
- Regardless of firing position, all FRT-equipped **handgun fire is limited to a 15-yard maximum distance from the berm** and requires the handgun to be gripped with both hands.
- As a reminder, shooting club-owned steel targets with an FRT is prohibited (regardless of distance).

The above distance limits are not a reflection of the shooter's skills, but rather a necessity based on the dimensions of the Club berms. Accordingly, regardless of skill level, all shooters must follow these distance restrictions. Additionally, FRT-equipped firearms are by nature noisier than their equivalent equipped with a factory trigger so, within reason, adequate open space between shooters should be maintained.

ENFORCEMENT GUIDELINES

Any individual determined to violate this policy or is found to have negligently fired consecutive rounds in such a fashion as to "skip the berm" (*regardless of whether an FRT is being used*), shall have their Range-Use privileges immediately suspended pending further disciplinary action. The offending member(s) shall be required to meet with the Club's CRSO. Following this meeting, the Club CRSO shall then make a disciplinary recommendation to the Board. Such recommendation shall include, if appropriate, specific prerequisites for the offending member to be returned to Good Standing.
